FIV: Catching a Bad Case of the Rumors



I'm Tippy, the executive Office Cat. I'm healthy, I am loved, I run the office, and...I'm FIV positive. I'd like you to also meet Villita, Henry and Coal. We're all here to tell you about FIV.

Despite what many people think, cats with Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV) can live perfectly long, happy, healthy lives. It is a lentivirus, meaning that it progresses very slowly, gradually affecting a cat's immune system. It is passed through the blood – from serious penetrating bite wounds by stray, already-infected cats (yet another good reason to keep your cat indoors!). FIV is transmissible only from cat to cat -- neither you nor your dog can get FIV from a cat. In fact, the only thing about FIV that you CAN catch is a bad case of the rumors!



I'm Villita. I have a purr that doesn't quit and am a beauty to boot; an unusual orange and white tabby girl (most orange felines are male) and I'm doubly special because...I'm FIV positive.

FIV may cause a cat very little difficulty, and cats often live 10 to 15 years after diagnosis. Many have no higher level of disease or illness than cats without FIV, but it's important to know if a cat has FIV, because it has a bearing on how you manage the cat's health. They need annual or semi-annual checkups, so that if they do become ill, addressing the problems quickly will help these cats live long lives. Many times, if these cats do become sick, they will respond to treatment just as well as a cat that does not have FIV.



We are Henry and Coal. We came in about the same time last September and are now the best of friends. We're two super outgoing guys who live and play together in the TALGV kitchen (after everyone has gone home) and...we're FIV positive.

Many feel that FIV cats should be the only cat in the home, but interestingly, recent data have shown that if cats do not fight (and few cats fight to the extent of drawing blood), the disease is not transmitted within the household at all.

All rescue groups are faced with the dilemma of what to do with cats that test positive for FIV. Since these cats stand a reasonable chance of being healthy for many years, it is heartbreaking to see these loving creatures relegated to a life in a confined space away from other cats and with little human interaction (or, in many shelters, euthanized because of the stigma associated with FIV).



If you already have a cat with FIV, consider adding a cat that also has this infection. If you don't have a cat yet, consider adding an FIV positive cat to your life. As with any special needs pet (we prefer the term "extra special"), these cats are adoptable and make wonderful companions. Including one in your life can have an extraordinary effect -- not only do they show deep appreciation and love when given a second chance, but their courage and determination to carry on is truly inspiring.

All of our FIV cats are available for adoption. Tippy says, "Even office cats dream about early retirement." Won't you consider making the dream of a forever home a reality for one or more of these extra special cats?



Bricks for Remembrance



Approaching the main entrance to the Animal League of Green Valley is a walkway of engraved bricks. These bricks memorialize and honor people and pets, both living and dead. They were purchased by many supporters of TALGV, and placed by volunteers. Reading the inscriptions is a nostalgic look at treasured memories.

This brick walk was a money-raising project created by the Fundraising Committee in late 2006 to help pay for a much-needed new building. For a donation of \$100, supporters could order an engraved brick containing up to three rows of lettering with sixteen characters per line. The bricks commemorate mostly dogs and cats, but also include many people and even a horse and a ferret.

All the bricks have been supplied by Cut In Stone of Eldorado, Texas, a family-owned company that does high-quality work. To date, almost 300 engraved bricks have been placed in the walk, and orders are still being received. A total of 450 bricks are in the walk, including blank bricks, which are removed and replaced with engraved bricks as donations are received. Since its inception, the walk has been a popular way of creating a lasting memory of a person or pet. TALGV hopes that interest in this project will continue, and has planned space for future expansion.

It is truly amazing what love will do for all of us!




Riley, a one-year-old gray and white sweet prince of a kitten, was brought to TALGV because his people were moving and he couldn't go with them. He arrived with a badly infected neck from an unknown source. One of the many vets who examined him thought that it might have been dermatitis, while some felt it may have been a reaction to a shot or an allergy, but they all agreed the condition was being exacerbated by his constant scratching. Curing poor Riley was an uphill battle. An Elizabethan collar just made it worse. Numerous medications and ointments were tried and failed. Wrapping his back feet to cover his claws didn't work. Wrapping his neck was ineffective. Applying "soft paws" was futile. Finally, after many months, an experimental surgery succeeded and he seemed to be on the path to wellness. But during this long process, the skin on his back feet started to break down, and another infection was born, which ultimately caused him to lose his back leg.

Throughout all of these travails, Riley remained a good-natured, sweet, and loving little boy. Kathie, one of his caretakers, fell in love with him over the long months of his convalescence, and she decided she needed to make this game, engaging boy her own. And although Riley had had plenty of attention over the months of his many treatments, more than anything else, he needed someone to love him and a person he could call his own. Kathie adopted Riley and renamed him "Swayze" after Patrick Swayze, who had waged a courageous battle against cancer. In addition, she thought Riley had some pretty fancy dance steps himself.

Kathie says he immediately fit right in with her dog and other cat. They groom each other and regularly get "the crazies," racing through the house. He is a devoted lap- and shoulder-cat, bestowing purrs and "pet me" bumps to both Kathie and her husband, Pete. He loves his mouse toy and anything else that moves. He is also a great talker, and looks you straight in the eye as though of course you understand exactly what he's saying. He is a joy and a miracle and he gives the love he feels from his people right back. He has found his "forever" home.


