"golden years," needed to stay together. They were housebroken, leash trained and got along with other dogs, but they were having their grumpy days as well as their good days. Still, the payback


could be immense for people who understood what would bring happiness to this old,

Protecting Your Dog from the Summer Sun

#1 – Walk Early in the Morning or Evening The sun's rays are the worst between 10am and 4pm. Limit time outside during these hours.

#2 - Check the Ground Before Walking

Be sure the ground is not too hot for your dog's paws – they can burn! A good test is to stick your own hand or arm on the ground. If you can leave it there for five seconds, it's okay for your dog to walk on it. When it doubt, consider putting booties on your dog's paws.

#3 – Give them shade If you are staying outside, make sure your dog has shade he can get to. If there is no natural shade, create some with a patio umbrella or a canopy.

#4 - Tint Your Windows If your dog spends long hours napping in the sun streaming through your window, he is still getting those harmful UV-rays. You can tint the windows on your house with films that offer UV-filtering protection. It will also help you save money on your cooling bills!

#5 – Sun Protective Clothing They make summer clothes for dogs, such as jackets and sunglasses, which are made to block rays as well. Look for tags with "Ultraviolet Protection Factor" (UPF) of at least 30.

#6 – Don't Forget the Belly Be sure to cover the belly on your short-haired breeds – the sun's rays are reflected off sand, concrete, water etc., and can not only burn your dog, but increases the chance for skin cancer. So put a shirt on him, or stay off hot, reflective surfaces and opt for those shady, grassy spots.

#7 – Use an Umbrella Walking with a UV blocking umbrella can really help keep those harmful rays off you and your dog when you are out for a walk. It provides constant shade, keeping you both cooler.

#8 - Keep That Coat! Don't shave your dog. Although your dog may seem hot, his coat actually works to insulate him against the heat AND keeps those harmful rays away from his sensitive skin.

#9 – Use Sunscreen Make sure you put sunscreen on any area where your dog's skin is exposed: nose, paws, underbelly, etc. This includes that pink skin that shows through on short-haired dogs.



LOVE AT FIRST SIGHT



erendipity...Fate...Kismet... Call it what you will, but for Rio, a handsome, 5-year-old black Lab from Rio Rico, and the folks at St. Luke's Home in Tucson, it was love at first sight!

The day back in September 2014 when the TALGV office received two calls—one from the owner of Rio needing to rehome him, and one from St. Luke's looking for a companion dog for their some 65 residents (they prefer the more respectful term "elders" to "seniors"), our perceptive receptionist said, "Hey, I wonder if these would be a match?" And indeed they were.

St. Luke's Home is an assisted-

living facility governed by the principles of the "Eden Alternative." It is one of five elder-centered communities in the Southwest committed to creating a "human habitat" where life revolves around close and continuing contact with plants, animals, and children, and creates the opportunity for those living there to give as well as receive care.

Upon learning that TALGV might have the perfect dog for them, not only the administrators but an entire busload of elders made the trip to Green Valley to meet their potential new

resident, and after meeting Rio there was no question that this was the dog for them. The match was made.

Not that he wasn't "just perfect" to begin with, but in

order to keep both Rio and the residents safe, the 70-pound addition to their home needed a bit of additional training. They had to be sure he wouldn't go out open doors unaccompanied, would walk and heel easily on leash, and learn to pace himself to each individual walker's speed. A wonderful trainer from Central Pet came to the rescue and worked with both the elders and staff; and quick learner that he is, Rio has become an indispensable, impeccably behaved member of the St. Luke's community.




Although he has chosen one particular resident as "his own," Rio shares his time with everyone who lives at or visits the facility - greeting callers with an enthusiastic tail wag, a "check-you-out" sniff, and a lick to let you know how happy he is to have met you. He often "sits in" under the table during

staff meetings, and has proven invaluable in the medication room, where he reassures and calms those

receiving care that things will be just fine with him by their side.

St. Luke's currently has two other dogs and several cats and birds that belong to individual elders, along with two desert tortoises, Erik the cockatiel, and a few community cats that visit each morning and evening for their daily meals. But Rio is the "star of the show"—sharing his joie de vivre with everyone he meets.



More assisted living communities would do well to follow the example of St. Luke's philosophy that "people come here to live, not to die." The happiness and enthusiasm for life that the elders display in their interaction with the public and amongst themselves is in no small part due to the fact that they are allowed and encouraged to share their lives with other living things.


