# Pit Bulls – Dispelling the Myth The Truth About One of America's Most Popular Breeds

The Pit Bull's innate love of people is part of his heritage. In 19<sup>th</sup> century England the Pit Bull, known as the Stafford, was created from Bulldog and terrier breeds and specifically bred not to be aggressive toward people. Today the Pit Bull is prized for his courage, intellect, tenacity, and especially for his love of friends and family. Pit Bulls are wiggly, cuddly, affectionate dogs; they like to remind you regularly of how they feel about you, and in general this means a lot of tail wagging and kissing.

Long before they were known as fighter dogs, Pit Bulls were family dogs. The breed has a particular fondness for children. In England the Pit Bull or Stafford is affectionately called "the

nanny dog" for his desire to play with and watch over children. Remember Petey, the mascot pup with the black eye patch in "The Little Rascals"? Petey was a Pit Bull.

The "Pit Bull" isn't an actual breed at all, but a slang term that current American culture uses to describe many large/stocky dogs that have a big head, cropped ears, brindle coat or eye patch. The true breeds most commonly labeled as Pit Bulls are American Pit Bull Terrier, American Staffordshire Terrier and Staffordshire Bull Terrier.

Unfortunately, the Pit Bull became popular with a subculture that has exploited this breed by forcing them into dog fighting rings. With the explosion of Pit Bull breeders, thousands of Pit Bulls have ended up in shelters across the country, topping the list of the most euthanized pet. No other breed in history has been so misunderstood or made the villain as long or as often as the Pit Bull. Sadly, these trends continue today, 20 years after they started. At the same time, millions of Pit Bulls are living peacefully as adored family pets in homes throughout the country.

#### PIT BULL FACTS

#### Pit Bulls always test high as one of the most stable breeds of dogs in the country.

Pit Bulls have temperaments similar to Golden Retrievers, Beagles or other popular dogs. In a recent study of 122 dog breeds, Pit Bulls achieved a passing rate of 83.9%. That's better than Beagles ... 78.2%, and Golden Retrievers ... 83.2%. The American Temperament Test Society of the United States, rates Pit Bulls as one of the top five most stable dogs. Because of this, they are extremely patient and tolerant of children.

#### Pit Bulls are athletic and love to get out and play.

It's important to remember that Pit Bulls are terriers – they're energetic and ready to go from zero to full throttle in a second. They're a happy-go-lucky breed and great to come home to. Informed, experienced owners who enjoy a wide variety of activities often love the athletic, nimble Pit Bull.

#### Pit Bulls are easy to train. All they want to do is please you.

The highly intelligent Pit Bull, like all dogs, wants an in-charge owner who can make and enforce rules, provide socialization, and at least basic obedience training. Pit Bulls are extremely easy to train. Because they are so sensitive to your feelings, verbal training comes easily with this breed. Pit Bulls want to please you and can be as active as you want to be, no matter what you're doing.

#### Pit Bulls can live with other dogs and/or cats.

Pit Bulls coexist comfortably with other pets when raised with them in a properly supervised household. With proper training handling, and supervision your Pit Bull can learn to live peacefully in the company of other dogs and often cats as well.

#### Pit Bulls are great family dogs.

Pit bulls thrive on interaction with their family and will languish if shut away. They love their owners and are a shadow around the house. They crave attention and companionship and have a great zest for life. Pit Bulls are the equivalent of people who are always happy.

The reality is that Pit Bulls are intelligent, loyal and loving companions. All they ask is that we return their love in a secure and forever home.



TALGV's new **Y**outh **I**ntern **P**rogram, developed by TALGV volunteer, Petra Gross, began on May 31, 2011. That's when 49 newly trained teenage volunteers arrived to help fill the vacancies left by the departure of many adult volunteers who are winter visitors here in Green Valley.

There was some apprehension on the part of all involved as the YIPs, as they are called, arrived for work. The teens were not sure what was expected of them, and the adult volunteers and coordinators wondered how these young people would fit into daily life at TALGV.

On duty for at least four hours a day, one or more days a week, the teens soon proved that they are enthusiastic, hard-working, dedicated and responsible volunteers. They scoop cat litter, pick up dog poop, mop floors, wash dishes and do laundry. Working diligently, they complete all their work promptly allowing plenty of time for the dogs and cats to receive lots of love and attention from both the YIPs and the adult volunteers.

Sharing their love for the animals, the YIPs and their fellow adult volunteers quickly realized how much they have in common. All are committed to the welfare of the animals at TALGV, to the importance of spaying and neutering, and to educating the public about responsible pet ownership so there will one day be "A HOME FOR EVERY PET".

The apprehension has turned to admiration and as one TALGV volunteer said, "We now have new faith in the next generation and what they can accomplish."

The hope is that the teens will choose to continue volunteering at TALGV on weekends and during school vacations, and when they return next summer they will be joined by even more YIP volunteers.

## TALGV Board of Directors Welcomes New Member

Geoff Knight became a member of TALGV's Board of Directors in June, accepting the appointment following the resignation of Joyce McGhie. Geoff will continue as Information Technology Coordinator.

Geoff was born in England. After completing a mechanical engineering degree he was drafted into the Royal Air Force and served two years in Libya where he learned to love the desert. Upon returning home he began his career with British Coal Corporation, received an MSc in

engineering, eventually becoming director of research and development. His work involved extensive travel in eastern and western Europe, Russia, China, Australia and the USA. He and his wife, Sharon, were married in 1985 and lived in England until Geoff retired in 1989. They moved to the San Francisco Bay Area where Geoff worked as a consultant and became a U.S. citizen.

Geoff and Sharon moved to Tucson in 1993 and Geoff worked with Tucson high school students in the Junior Achievement program. In 1999, Geoff and Sharon left for Nova Scotia, Canada, to be near family and were quickly immersed in the local community. Geoff joined the Board of Directors of the Colchester Community Workshops Foundation to facilitate the development of a 20,000 sq.ft. vocational training workshop to accommodate up to 100 mentally challenged adults. Geoff's responsibilities included determining the location of the new facility, the conceptual design of the building, the evaluation of construction bids, the placing of contracts and overseeing the construction and commissioning of the finished building.

Geoff and Sharon returned to Arizona in 2005 and decided that Green Valley was perfect for them. They discovered The Animal League soon after they arrived when their cat, Smokey, went missing and a stray cat took up residence at their home. Once settled in their new home, they began looking for volunteer opportunities in Green Valley. Being animal lovers, TALGV was an obvious choice. Now, Zoe and Max, two TALGV adoptees rule the roost. Geoff can be found most afternoons at TALGV working diligently on our database.

### We're Growing and We Need More Space


Our building expansion project is moving forward and none too soon. The number of homeless animals is increasing and our current facilities are over-capacity. Thanks to the unrelenting hard work and dedication of our volunteers, we have been able to keep these animals healthy and well-socialized.

We are very grateful to the many organizations, businesses, and individuals who have responded to our request for funds for this project. We currently have approximately one-third of the amount needed and are optimistic that the groundbreaking will occur in early 2012. We will complete as much of the project as finances will allow. In addition to more and friendlier animal housing, we are in great need of space to hold meetings and conduct training, to contain our increasingly necessary information technology department, and to provide veterinary facilities to care for the many health needs of our residents.

We have seen a significant increase in the number of animals needing to be sheltered (see graph below), and we are doing everything possible to not have to turn them away. The Animal League of Green Valley has found homes for 2,791 homeless pets since January 2007, but this is not enough. In addition to expanding our facilities, we must address the pet overpopulation problem at its source, so to this end we have been increasing our free and low cost spay and neuter outreach program as rapidly as funding will permit. Last year TALGV was able to provide spay/neuter for over 400 cats and dogs whose owners could not afford it.

Thanks again to TALGV's supporters who have backed our efforts with monetary donations and as donors and shoppers in our Attic Thrift Store, we are moving toward the day when there will be "A HOME FOR EVERY PET". Your continuing support is much needed and most appreciated.


