TALGV's New Days & Hours

The Animal League of Green Valley is now open to the public from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., seven (7) days a week! The new afternoon and Sunday hours provide additional opportunities for people to visit and interact with our adoptable animals and shop at The Attic Thrift Store, which is a major source of the funds needed to care for the 60 to 100 cats and dogs living at TALGV on any given day.

Even though these new hours have impacted the daily schedule of many of TALGV's several hundred volunteers, these people have adjusted their lives and embraced the extended hours because they are "for the animals," the standard by which everything that is done at The Animal League is measured. The volunteers who care for the animals (pet pals and dog handlers) start at 8:00 a.m. or earlier, so a new, second shift is being recruited to continue through until 2:00 pm. It begins at 10:30 a.m., perfect for late risers or otherwise committed early risers.

The increased hours went into effect on January 25, and with them came an increase in adoptions and Attic sales, and, at least for the time being, a more leisurely, less crowded experience in the afternoons.

Every cat or dog that is adopted means there is room to take in another, as we all work toward the goal of a "no kill community", a community that takes care of all of its homeless pets.

So Visit, Adopt, Shop, and Tell Your Friends.


Why to Adopt a Senior Pet and How it Helps You and Them




Senior animals can be superior companions for human seniors. They aren't overly energetic (like puppies and kittens), don't need to be housebroken and know not to scratch or chew the furniture. Moreover, it's not true that "old dogs can't learn new tricks" - Broadway animal trainer William Berloni adopts all of his performing animals from shelters and prefers mature animals, saying they are happy to accept new living patterns in exchange for obtaining "a new leash on life." And, since young animals are the most frequently adopted, you'll also have the satisfaction of knowing that you may well have saved your new pet's life.

If you don't share your home with a companion animal, and especially if you live alone, you're missing out on all the health benefits they offer companion animals can...

- Instill a sense of well-being
- Promote lower blood pressure
- Decrease the likelihood of depression in older adults
- Promote higher self-esteem in older people than those who don't care for companion animals


