25 YEARS

It's time for a celebration, a celebration of 25 years of helping people and pets in Green Valley, and from Sahuarita to Rio Rico, west to the longtime ranches and settlements and east to Vail. The Animal League of Green Valley was founded by Margaret Roesch in 1984 with help from co-founder Bert Cowper. In 1984, a building to shelter homeless animals was an ambitious goal for the fledgling organization, and even though many helped, all agree that it never would have happened without the tenacity of Margaret. Two pieces of land, one on Camino Casa Verde and another on Beta Street, were bought and sold, under duress, before TALGV found its home at 1600 W. Duval Road. But things worked out for the best, because otherwise we would today be sandwiched in between the bowling alley and an apartment complex. Margaret was not initially an animal person; she was a people person. She was working in hospice and found people were concerned, not as much about themselves as about what would happen to their pets when they were no longer able to care for them. She felt their distress, and founded The Animal League of Green Valley so that people in Green Valley would have the peace of mind that comes with knowing that that a beloved pet would be always be cared for. Today TALGV also helps as many other cats and dogs in need as resources and facilities will permit.

Even though the struggle for a physical facility took 17 years, homeless pets were cared for during those years in foster homes, and many of the cats lived in Margaret's refurbished Arizona room. The initial phase of the shelter was opened to the public in 2001, and from that point on the growth and recognition of The League began to accelerate.

In 2004, 96 cats and dogs were adopted from the shelter. This year we will adopt out over 700. But the best part of this is not the numbers but what happens to these cats and dogs during their stay at TALGV. Each day they are lovingly cared for, fed, medical needs taken care of, brushed, played with, trained, walked, hugged and petted by a cadre of tireless volunteers. We joke about college professors cleaning litter boxes, but it's true. No job is too menial if it is for these innocent, loving beings that are entrusted to our care. So what are we celebrating? We are celebrating an idea that became a reality, a heritage of dedication and perseverance, that today is a highly respected organization operating on a firm foundation of policies and procedures, financial stability and a set of core values and beliefs about the care and worth of pets in our society. We are celebrating our volunteers, our donors, our Attic Thrift Shop, our foster parents, our adopters, and our four-legged residents. We are celebrating a shelter that is a model for others and a source of pride for the citizens of our community.

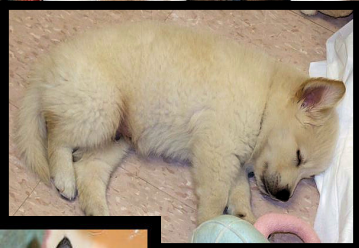
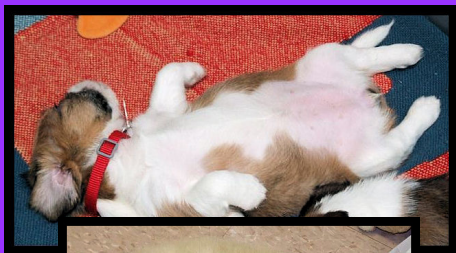
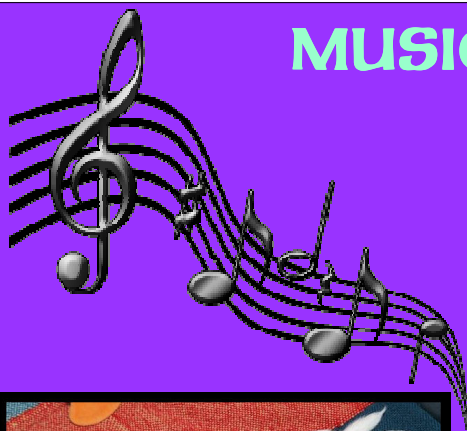

MUSIC TO THEIR EARS

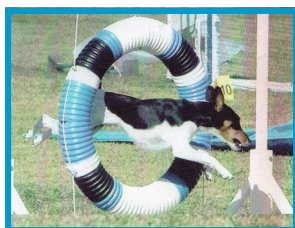


Once our new West Wing was up and running we realized the need to improve ease of communication and to quickly locate people in the expanded TALGV property. This led to the installation of an intercom system. A bonus of this equipment was that it presented the opportunity to play music throughout the kennel areas. Would this be good for the animals? Well, searching for opinions we found what seemed to be empirical evidence – or was it just folklore? – that dogs do indeed like music. How many of us secretly leave a radio or TV on at home to stop our pets feeling lonely? The findings showed that classical music had the greatest calming effect, and so it was decided that classical music would be played throughout the kennels at TALGV -- especially in the non-business hours. As we look back on the experience of the last few months even the most skeptical of the dog handlers attest that their charges are indeed calmer and less stressed with the addition of the piped music. Only now have we come across very recent scientific psychoacoustic research at veterinary schools in both the UK and the US that have evaluated the effect of music on the emotional comfort of dogs, especially in shelter conditions. Their conclusions are that not only is music found to be calming in itself, it is also effective in masking other noises that might be stressful – just as we have observed! After the hustle and bustle of the business hours the kennels become almost disturbingly quiet and noises such as the snoring or whimpering of a dog in a nearby kennel or even its footfalls, sight unseen, can be stressful. The music not only masks such sounds but is probably reassuring that all is well. What of the cats? Well cats are a little harder to read – but we suspect they are also serenely enjoying the soothing effects of the classical music!

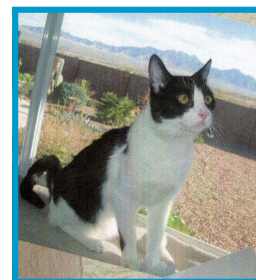

HEALTH HINTS FOR YOUR PET

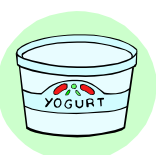

Pets can develop skin cancer and need summer sun protection just like we do. If your dog has a light colored nose and/or skin, thin or missing hair, or has been shaved for surgery, be sure to apply sun block to those areas. Check with your vet

for recommended sun blocks and apply every 4 to 6 hours when they are in the sun.

Plain pumpkin is a great digestive regulator whether for diarrhea or constipation. Use a generous tablespoon twice a day for large dogs and adjust down the amount for smaller dogs and cats.



If your pet has a flatulence problem, try a tablespoon of yogurt (a teaspoon for small dogs and cats) mixed into their food twice a day. Yogurt's probiotics help speed food absorption through the digestive system thus decreasing flatulence.

If Fido sips from the toilet bowl when the lid's up and you worry about bowl cleaning residue making him sick try this: Sprinkle 2 tablespoons of orange-flavored crystals (e.g. Tang) into the water, swish with a brush and let sit over night. The citric acid in the mix dissolves grime, leaves the porcelain sparkling, and makes the water safe for pooch's drinking.

AZ Legislative Update

Please thank District 30 Sen. Jonathan Paton and Gov. Jan Brewer for pushing through the state legislature and signing into law the Omnibus Animal Anti-Cruelty Bill which took effect September 30. Legislation was passed that:

- 1) Bans intentional, staged fighting of any species of animal.
- 2) Includes language designed to prevent puppy mills from taking advantage of licensing price breaks aimed at legitimate kennels.
- 3) Makes it possible for the inspection of kennels with a written warrant
- 4) Bans horse tripping which is roping the legs of a galloping horse
- 5) Creates a public registry of equine-rescue facilities
- 6) Requires shelters to spay/neuter and microchip unlicensed dogs and cats who have been impounded, or have bitten a person, before releasing the animal to the owner. If the owner wishes to forgo the requirement, they must pay a fee.

Our politicians often hear from us when we are unhappy about things. They should also hear from us when we are pleased. 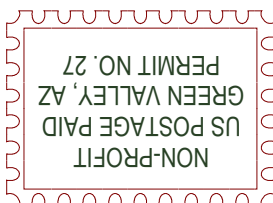
