OUTREACH PROGRAMS KEEP PEOPLE AND PETS TOGETHER

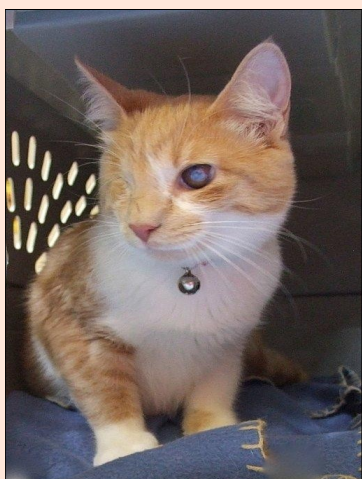

At TALGV we are all about rescuing as many homeless companion animals as possible but what about the pets in need of help who are attached to a human? The bad economy has impacted animals as well as people. Every day anguished owners are forced to relinquish beloved pets with treatable illnesses and injuries because they cannot afford veterinary care. Many of these pets wind up at animal control where they face certain death. When owners cannot afford to spay or neuter their animals unwanted litters are born, adding to the growing overpopulation problem that is causing so much suffering and death. Dreadful diseases like parvo and distemper spread through communities because animals are not properly vaccinated.

To address these problems and help keep animals in loving homes, TALGV instituted its Spay/Neuter Outreach program in 2010 and more recently added the Outreach Medical program. If an animal owner lives within our area and meets the criteria as a low income family, we will help them with free or low cost shots, spaying and neutering and medical care for their pets.

Every day we see the positive changes that these programs bring to companion animals and their owners. Many of the people seeking help originally rescued the animal due to abandonment or a neglect/abuse situation. Our Outreach programs are helping rescue not just the animals but the rescuers as well.

Here are just four out of the hundreds we have been able to help through our Outreach programs:



Blossom was only a few months old when she was found alone by a dumpster at a fast food restaurant. The little kitten's eyes were terribly inflamed and swollen shut, either from trauma or a serious infection. The lady who found her was willing to keep her but could not afford the veterinary care. Through TALGV's Medical Outreach program, Blossom received treatment for her

eyes as well as spaying and shots. Partial sight was saved in only one eye but she is now a happy and healthy pet. Her owner says Blossom's name really fits her because she has blossomed into such a loving part of their family.

Hearing barking inside the recently deserted home next door, a neighbor was able to obtain entrance to the home where she found **three tiny abandoned puppies**. She enlisted the help of her sisters, and they worked diligently to care for the little pups. Each decided to keep one, but they had limited funds for the necessary shots, spaying and neutering. Through TALGV's Outreach Program they were given help to obtain these medical necessities and the pups are now happily living in loving homes.

A Tired Dog is a Good Dog

Remember being a kid on a rainy Saturday morning? Most likely you were upset because you were stuck inside and you had other plans. You'd begin to bounce off the walls if you didn't find something to do.

That's how it is for our dogs when we don't provide them an outlet to exercise. They become pent up with energy, and they don't know what to do with it. Then the trouble starts. Destructive chewing,

digging, and other undesirable behaviors from a bored, under-exercised dog begin to take their toll.

Sadly, the outcome is often not good, and people give up on their dogs. Many of them are dumped in the desert and along highways, simply because their owners were not able or willing to take the time to exercise them. More often than not a lack of exercise is one of the major underlying causes of behavioral problems. What the owner thought was a misbehaved dog was simply a dog that was not getting enough exercise.

Next to food and water, exercise is a basic need. Walking is a primal activity for a dog. It is our responsibility to make the effort to walk them every day.

Two daily 35 to 45 minute walks are recommended. Walk as briskly as you are comfortable with so that you and your dog get a workout. The dog should be at your side or slightly behind... not out front walking you.

Hot weather is here, so don't forget to take water. Be aware that it can be much hotter down on the ground where your dog is, so avoid the middle of the day when the sun is at its peak. The cool of the early morning and after the sun has gone down are the best times to walk during summer.

Time your walk. Get into a rhythm, get your heart rate up, take charge of yourself and your dog and get going. After 10 minutes at a good steady clip, give your dog a couple minutes off to drink, sniff and eliminate. Then walk another 10 minutes and so on. This routine is usually enough to take the edge off most dogs.

The difference between an under-exercised dog and one who has had his exercise needs met is huge. You will see it in your dog's relaxed attitude after the walk. A tired dog is a good dog. So before giving up on your misbehaving dog, stop and ask yourself, "Is my dog getting enough exercise?"

Raji

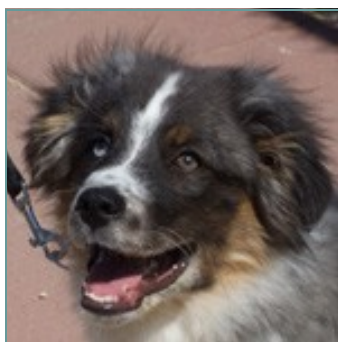

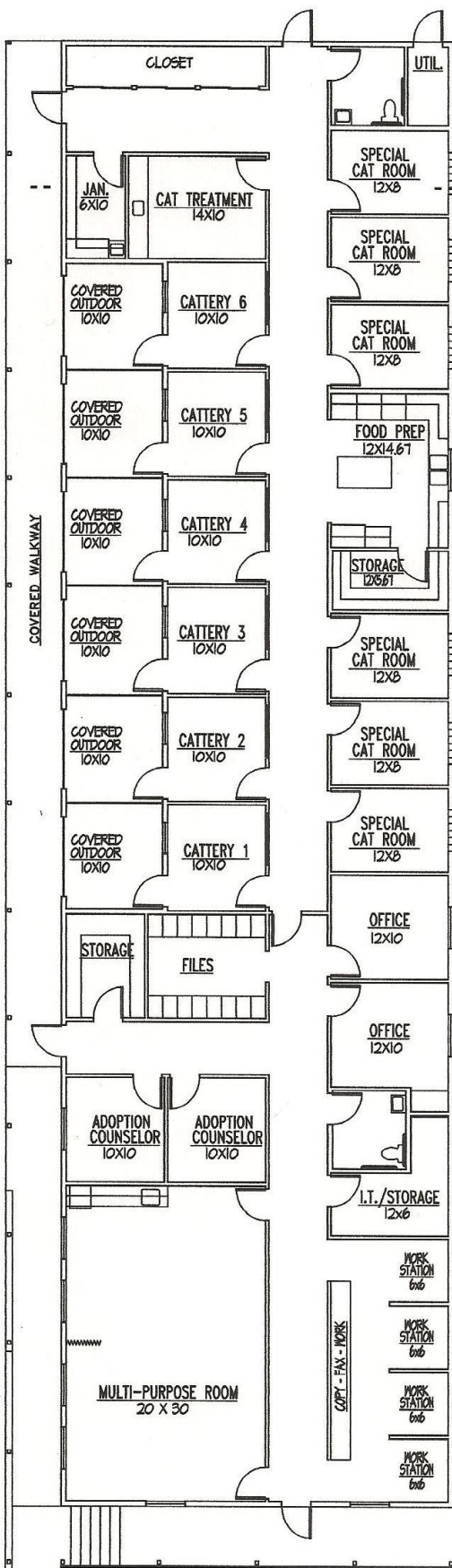


Snickers

BUILDING EXPANSION PROJECT UPDATE



Scale Back

After much consideration it has been agreed to scale back earlier plans to build new facilities for both dogs and cats as a single project. Our major concerns were increased cost estimates, funding and outgrowing our volunteer workforce.

Cat Space

We will, instead, build the joint project in two phases, the first being a new cat wing. This will double the space available for our 90 to 150 cats and provide a dedicated cat medical treatment room for routine health care. There are also six specialized care rooms for sick or injured cats, kittens and those with other special needs.

Dog Space

The existing cat rooms will be converted to additional dog kennels and the former cat kitchen will become a dog medical treatment room.

People Space

The new wing has also been designed to make long overdue improvements to our administration facilities, allowing greater privacy for adoption procedures, and a new IT center with up to six workstations. A multi-purpose room will allow much needed meeting and staff training facilities and a better option for public education.

Approval

The provisional drawings for the new wing have been approved by the Building Committee and the TALGV Board. The architect is developing detailed construction drawings which will allow contractors to bid the work in July and gain the approval of the Town of Sahuarita. Our hope is to at last break ground in September 2012.
